SENATE UNANIMOUSLY ADOPTS CENTENNIAL RESOLUTION COMMENDING A.D.A.; ASSOCIATION LAUDED FOR 'SELFLESSNESS AND DEVOTION' TO NATION'S HEALTH

In tribute to the Centennial Year of the Association, the Senate last week unanimously adopted a resolution commending the dentists of the United States for having "achieved world-wide recognition for their contributions to improved health." In a report urging the adoption of the resolution, the Senate Committee on Labor and Public Welfare, headed by Sen. Hill (D., Ala.), praised the A.D.A. for "the selflessness and devotion with which the American Dental Association has repeatedly sponsored programs which have contributed greatly to the dental health of the people of America and, indeed, of peoples throughout the world." The committee noted that in legislation concerned with health matters, it had "invariably found" representatives of the Association to be concerned that proposed laws "would be so designed as to best advance the health of our nation." Seventy-nine senators, an unusually high number, joined with Sen. Murray (D., Mont.) in sponsoring the resolution. Following is the text of the centennial resolution:

Whereas the American Dental Association, representing more than 85 per centum of the nation's dentists, has for one hundred years been effective in advancing the art and science of dentistry and extending their benefits to more and more people; and

Whereas the dental health care available to the people of the United States is superior to any in the world; and

Whereas the high level of dental education in the United States has enabled American dentists to prevent as well as treat and control dental disease; and

Whereas the dental profession of the United States has sponsored scientific research which has produced many outstanding results designed to improve the health, comfort, and appearance of all citizens; and

Whereas further research will be enhanced by construction of the new building for the National Institute of Dental Research at Bethesda, Maryland, which was vigorously supported in the Congress by the American Dental Association; and

Whereas the dentists of the United States have achieved worldwide recognition for their contributions to improved health; and

Whereas the American Dental Association is observing its centennial during the year 1959, the actual date of organization being August 3, 1859: Therefore be it

Resolved, that the felicitations and best wishes of the Congress of the United States are hereby cordially extended to the American Dental Association on its many and varied contributions to the health of the people and upon the occasion of the one hundredth anniversary of the founding of the Association.

RELIEF FUND SHORT \$5,000 OF GOAL; REMINDER APPEAL SENT

Contributions to the 1958-59 Relief Fund as of Feb. 28 totaled \$94,909.74, nearly \$15,000 less than had been given by the same time last year. More than \$5,000 still remains to be raised, if the \$100,000 quota is to be achieved. Dr. H. R. Bleier of Milwaukee, chairman of the A.D.A. Council on Relief, has sent a reminder to members of those state societies in which the quota has not been reached. As Dr. Bleier noted in his letter, the Relief Fund files are filled with expressions of gratitude from dentists and their families who have had to rely on the fund for help. This year 28 constituent societies and one federal dental service have surpassed their quotas, as compared with 43 societies and one federal dental service at the same time last year.

CABINET OFFICIAL CHALLENGES FLUORIDATION OPPONENTS

An excellent statement challenging the opponents of water fluoridation was issued by Arthur S. Flemming, Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, at his news conference Feb. 9. The statement, probably the most forthright public pronouncement on the subject from a high-ranking government official to date, took vigorous issue with the program's failure to be placed in operation in every fluoride-deficient community in the country and pointed out that "the American Dental Association, the American Medical Association and virtually all other scientific and professional organizations having competence in the field have recommended the fluoridation of public water supplies." 'DENTURIST' BILLS IN FOUR STATE LEGISLATURES; DEFEATED IN GEORGIA

"Public denturist" bills have been introduced in four state legislatures. The measures would permit technicians to deal directly with the public in the field of prosthetics. In Georgia, a bill sponsored by the Association of Independent Dental Laboratories of Georgia to permit "denturists" to make dentures directly for patients was defeated by the unanimous vote of the Hygiene and Sanitation Committee of the House of Representatives on Feb. 12 after representatives of the Georgia Dental Association and the State Dental Laboratories Association testified against it as "detrimental to the health and welfare of the people of this state." "Public denturist" bills have been introduced also in the state legislatures in Washington, Nevada and Oklahoma. In Illinois, where "denturist" legislation has been defeated in the last two sessions of the state legislature, representatives of the so-called Independent Dental Laboratories Association appeared before a subcommittee of the Illinois Medical Practice Act Commission Feb. 27 to urge again the enactment of "public denturist" legislation by the 1959 Illinois General Assembly.

U. S. ATTORNEY MOVES AGAINST THREE FIRMS UNDER TRAYNOR ACT

Action against alleged operators of three Chicago mail order denture firms accused of violating the federal denture law has been taken by the U.S. attorney's office in Chicago. The defendants named in the informations filed in the U.S. District Court are Lester B. Patterson of the Clinical Dental Laboratories, Mary Clyde and Beldon Clyde of the Tru-Grip Dental Laboratory and Eli Sutker and Lester Sutker of the All-State Dental Laboratory. Each violation of the Federal Denture Act is punishable by a maximum of one year in prison, or a \$1,000 fine, or both. The federal law, also known as the Traynor Act, was passed by Congress at the request of the Association in 1942.

NAME WILLIAM LOGAN DIRECTOR OF BUREAU OF PUBLIC INFORMATION

Appointment of Mr. William Allan Logan as director of the A.D.A. Bureau of Public Information has been announced by Dr. Harold Hillenbrand, Association secretary. Mr. Logan comes to the A.D.A. from St. Louis where for two years he was an executive of the Missouri State Medical Association. In that position, he handled public relations, represented the organization in programs with allied professional organizations and health groups, acted as legislative representative and served as staff editor of the journal. Prior to joining the staff of the medical association, he was for five years a member of the editorial staff of the Kansas City Star. Mr. Logan holds a bachelor's degree in economics from the University of Kansas City where he also did graduate work toward a master's degree in the same field. He is a veteran of World War II

A.D.A. BOARD OF TRUSTEES TO MEET MARCH 12-14

The A.D.A. Board of Trustees will hold its first 1959 session March 12-14. The meeting will be held in Association headquarters in Chicago.

NETWORK RADIO PROGRAM ON A.D.A. TO BE PRESENTED MARCH 19

The A.D.A. will be the subject of a half-hour network radio program on Thursday, March 19. The program will be presented at 9 p.m., eastern standard time, over most of the 282 stations of the American Broadcasting Company network. It is the second in a series of twice-weekly programs, entitled "Project Tomorrow—Report to the People," which is being presented under the auspices of the Council of National Organizations of the Adult Education Association in cooperation with the network. The A.D.A. is a member of the council. The program will emphasize the Association's centennial year, describe activities of the profession with respect to the public's dental needs and project the probable road ahead in dentistry. An alphabetical listing of all cities with ABC radio stations together with the call letters of the stations is contained in the two-page insert accompanying this issue of the A.D.A. News Letter. To help assure that the program will be heard, it is suggested that dental societies call local stations to check on the time the program will be presented.

A.D.A. PROTESTS SYNDICATED NEWSPAPER COLUMN ON DENTISTRY

The A.D.A. has sharply protested a newspaper column by a syndicated Hearst writer, Jim Bishop, that appeared Feb. 2 in papers across the country. The column described the author's "terror of dentistry" and asserted that the profession has advanced little since the days of Benjamin Franklin. In a letter to the columnist, the Bureau of Public Information described the article as "irresponsible journalism" and said in part:

The American Dental Association has received a flood of protests from members of the profession throughout the country regarding your column on dentistry of Feb. 2. Not only was the column a grossly unfair attack on a major health profession but also, and more importantly, it constituted an extremely grave disservice with respect to the health of the public....

The record of the profession is one of outstanding health service to the American people....To give to the public the impression that the profession has failed of advancement is to deter individuals from preventive care until irreparable damage is done.

A similar protest on behalf of the Association was made to Mr. Frank L. McLearn, director of King Features Syndicate, 235 E. 45th St., New York City, which distributes the column. A number of dental societies and individual dentists have protested the column in communications mainly to their local newspapers. In one city, Denver, protests to the editor of the Rocky Mountain News resulted in a special Sunday feature on advances in dentistry. Dental societies in areas where the column appeared may wish to write also to Mr. Bishop in care of the syndicate or to the syndicate itself.

DR. PHILLIPS HONORED BY HOSPITAL STAFF, TWO DENTAL SOCIETIES

Dr. Percy T. Phillips, of New York, Association president, has been the recipient of three honors in the past month. On Feb. 18, he was honored by the staff of Misericordia Hospital in New York at a testimonial dinner. Dr. Phillips is a member of the hospital's dental department. On Feb. 19, the Second District Dental Society of the State of New York presented him with a scroll "in appreciation of his many outstanding contributions to dentistry and in commemoration of the centennial of the American Dental Association." Earlier, on Jan. 28, Dr. Phillips received a scroll and key to the capital city of Puerto Rico from the mayor of San Juan at a reception in the city hall in his honor. Dr. Phillips was the principal speaker at the annual meeting of the Puerto Rico Dental Society.

PENSION PROGRAM FOR SELF-EMPLOYED APPROVED BY HOUSE COMMITTEE

The Ways and Means Committee of the House of Representatives has reported favorably on the Keogh-Simpson bill that would permit dentists and other self-employed individuals to set up their own retirement programs. Some 20 congressmen have introduced varying versions of the same bill which would permit self-employed persons a tax deferment on a limited portion of their income set aside for their retirement. On Feb. 23, the American Thrift Assembly, which was formed to encourage the establishment of voluntary pension plans by self-employed, held its first 1959 meeting in Chicago with Dr. Floyd Pillars, of Des Moines, Iowa, vice-chairman of the A.D.A. Council on Legislation, representing the Association. In other action in the legislative area, two representatives of the Association are presenting testimony at hearings on the proposed new International Institute for Health Research on March 4 before the Senate Labor and Public Welfare Committee. Dr. Matthew Besdine, of Brooklyn, N.Y., member of the Council on Legislation, and Dr. George C. Paffenbarger, of Washington, D.C., director of the A.D.A. research program at the National Bureau of Standards, are testifying on the legislation. The Association's House of Delegates approved the proposal in principle last November.

A.D.A. SEEKS INCREASE FOR RESEARCH AND TRAINING

A.D.A. representatives will also testify in mid-March on appropriations for dental research and health activities at hearings before the Subcommittee on the Departments of Labor, and Health, Education and Welfare of the House Appropriation Committee. The Association is seeking an increase of about \$2 million for research grants and fellowship and training programs. The administration's proposed budget for the new fiscal year, beginning July 1, again calls for a figure of \$7,420,000, the same amount as in the current budget for the National Institute of Dental Research. Meanwhile, the House voted 381 to 20 to extend for four more years the Universal Military Training and Service Act, which includes the provisions of the so-called doctor-draft law. At hearings, the Association presented testimony indicating that the A.D.A. is not opposed to the extension of the law providing the current safeguards it has advocated are retained. Similar testimony is being presented at hearings on the draft law being held this week by the Senate Armed Service Committee. As had been anticipated, Rep. Forand (D., R. I.) has now introduced his measure for providing health benefits for all persons eligible for benefits under the Old Age and Survivors' Insurance program of the Social Security Act. Meanwhile, the lower house of the Washington state legislature approved a resolution memorializing Congress to enact the Forand bill. It was considered possible that other state legislatures might attempt to take similar action, and constituent dental societies are urged to be on the alert for such actions.

DR. PHILLIPS URGES SUPPORT OF 1959 RED CROSS DRIVE

Dr. Percy T. Phillips, of New York, A.D.A. president, urges members to support the 1959 drive of the American Red Cross for contributions and members. In a letter to General Alfred M. Gruenther, president of the Red Cross, Dr. Phillips said: "The record of humanitarian services of the Red Cross makes it an honor to join in the 1959 campaign and I am confident that members of the dental profession throughout the country will support the drive in March."

FACULTY OF DENTISTRY ANNOUNCED FOR COLUMBIA UNIVERSITY

The School of Dental and Oral Surgery of Columbia University will achieve an independent status July 1 as the Faculty of Dentistry. Since 1945, it has been a unit of the Faculty of Medicine. Dr. Gilbert P. Smith will be the first dean of the new school. For the last two years he has been associate dean of the Faculty of Medicine for Dental and Oral Surgery. The action was announced Feb. 23 by Dr. Grayson Kirk, president of the university. In a letter to Dr. Smith, Dr. Percy T. Phillips, A.D.A. president, praised the move as one that would "do much to stimulate the growth and development of dental science and research."

TWO POSTGRADUATE CLINICS SCHEDULED FOR PHILADELPHIA MEETING

The Greater Philadelphia annual meeting of the Philadelphia County Dental Society is being held March 3-6 at the city's Sheraton Hotel. Two postgraduate clinics conducted by Dr. Balint Orban, of Colorado Springs, and Dr. Daniel Feder, of Beverley Hills, Calif, are a highlight of the meeting. Dr. Robert W. Gick, Jr., is general chairman of the meeting. Dr. Joseph V. Masino is president of the society.
