The ADA patient education brochure Antibiotics and Dental Treatment (W307) can help to clarify who should take antibiotics before dental treatment and who should not.


In dentistry, where the long observed standard has been to prescribe antibiotics for dental patients

# Tapping the 'power of three'

New ADA president calls for tripartite to work as one

New Orleans—Call it the "rule of three" or the "power of three," it is a combination familiar from childhood that ultimately permeates our lives.

It starts for most of us with the three little pigs, the three blind mice. In time, it graduates to higherminded interests: life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness; government of the people, by the people, for the

In his address to the House of Delegates Nov. 5—the day of his installation as the ADA's 150th president—Dr. Charles H. Norman noted that organized dentistry has a term for its own power of three: the tripartite.

"In 1912, the Association reorganized and adopted a new constitution and bylaws establishing the tripar-

tite membership structure," said the new president, a general dentist from Greensboro, N.C. "This structure empowered the organization to take its rightful place as the nation's advocate for the dental profession and has characterized the ADA ever since."

When in proper alignment, dentistry's three-tiered structure "builds upon the strength of component, constituent and national" organizations, said Dr. Norman. "But far too often," he added, "we are not recognized as one unified voice for dentistry, but as multiple organizations competing for a leadership role."

Competition within the tripartite creates a disjointed organization offering "duplicative services that are a drain on our limited resources," said the president. This, in turn, hampers efforts to address the pressing issues of the day-from health care reform, to globalization, to workforce issues and more.

Dr. Norman pinpointed three areas to which he said dentistry must



## Columbia, Mo., city council votes to continue fluoridation

Columbia, Mo.—Following nearly a year of discussions that originated with a request from a private citizen to stop fluoridating the city's water supply, the Columbia City Council voted unanimously Nov. 4 to continue fluoridating.

The fifth-largest city in Missouri, Colum-

bia has been fluoridating since 1973, when its water supply was changed from deep naturally fluoridated wells to shallow wells that contained only 0.3 ppm fluoride, said Dr. Lori Henderson, a pediatric dentist in Columbia who worked in the grass-roots effort to keep Columbia fluoridated.

Local dentists at the time of the switch

recommended maintaining the benefits of optimal fluoride levels and the city agreed to fluoridate the new water system, Dr. Hender-

"I learned a lot about the history of Columbia's fluoridation from Dr. Fletcher Burge, a retired dentist who reached out to me after the Central Dental Society executive director

put out a call for action," Dr. Henderson said. "This was my first rodeo, and it was a pretty amazing process."

Dr. Henderson, an active oral health advocate in her community who has presented in public many times, said the campaign for retaining fluoridation was very different from other oral health promotion activities.

"I participated in an ADA fluoridation training program in April," she said. I was very naïve in thinking that educating decision-makers about scientific evidence supporting the safety and efficacy of fluoridation would be enough. What I learned, at the training and later in my community, is that political strategy is equally important.

The Columbia Board of Health reviewed more than 100 articles and heard five hours of testimony during the process. The board presented its report and recommendation to continue fluoridation to the city council Oct. 21, but then 5th Ward Councilwoman Laura Nauser advanced a resolution to stop fluoridation and asked for public comment at the next meeting.



Dr. Henderson said she again reached out to local dentists, the pediatric and family medicine community, public health officials and other groups to quickly spread the word that community water fluoridation was still in jeopardy.

"A diverse coalition spoke at the Nov. 4 city council meeting," she said. "The first to speak was Dr. Paul Reid, former dental director of the Missouri Department of Health. Two pre-dental students also participated, and were able to experience the importance of public service. I was proud to be a part of the pro-fluoride coalition present for the vote to continue optimal fluoridation. It was a wonderful day."

After the vote, Ms. Nauser told the Columbia Tribune "that she had spoken with many constituents while gathering signatures for her re-election campaign and found the majority wanted to continue fluoridation. Because of that, she voted 'no' on the resolution, which sought to end fluoridation."



# ADA MOM event a magical success

*New Orleans*—The place where Fat Tuesday comes to life, Mardi Gras World is magical in and of itself.

But in the warehouse where Mardi Gras parade floats are constructed every year, a different kind of magic happened Nov. 3. Mardi Gras World played host to the first ADA Mission of Mercy charity dental clinic, held in conjunction with the Annual Session.

Nearly 800 people were treated, receiving services such as cleanings, restorative and specialty care, dentures, X-rays and more. More than 1,100 dentists, dental team members and others volunteered for the event.

"This is a great success," said Lani Becker, who coordinated the MOM event and is the associate executive director of the Wisconsin Dental Association and board member for America's Dentists Care Foundation, which hosted the event in conjunction with the ADA and the support of the Louisiana Dental Association and the New Orleans Dental Association. "We had three goals going into the event: raise enough money to support it; recruit enough volunteers to staff it; and treat around 1,000 patients. We've met all of those goals."

People began lining up outside of Mardi Gras World at 5 p.m. Nov. 2, spending the night outside and eagerly waiting to see a dentist. Meriam Wright, 56, was the first in line, and with only six top teeth and four bottom teeth, she wanted to have a full set so she could properly eat.

Ms. Wright said she's a diabetic and because she doesn't have many teeth, she has to stick with soft foods, which often means unhealthy fast food.

The warehouse was a sea of dental chairs and people with the sound of suction and buzzing filling the air. Musicians played while people waited in a tent outside to register, and there was a separate area for children who came to be treated.

The magic really started around 2 p.m. Nov. 2, when Charles Whitley, 53, received a phone call saying he could soon be out of pain.

Mr. Whitley works for Freeman, a trade show management company the ADA hired for the Annual Session.

He had been complaining of a bad toothache for the past two months and by being around the right people at the right time at the Annual Session, Mr. Whitley was connected to a dentist and ultimately the MOM event. A volunteer dentist pulled two of his teeth Nov. 2 and took an impression of his mouth so that a retainer with a new tooth could be made overnight.

Mr. Whitley, who has 10 children and no regular dentist or dental insurance, went to the MOM clinic Nov. 3 to receive a cleaning and to get his new tooth.

"That looks good," Mr. Whitley said while looking in the mirror. Upon leaving, he gave Janis McClelland, a volunteer dental hygienist from Sandpoint, Idaho, a big hug, thanking her for cleaning his teeth.

"It was certainly my pleasure to treat someone so pleasant," a teary-eyed Ms. McClelland said. "This is what it's all about; to help someone like that."

Walter Maggard, 58, is someone else who just happened to be at the right place at the right time. Mr. Maggard hadn't had any teeth for 33 years and both he and his wife, Kathryn Maggard, 58, are disabled, don't have a dental home and can't afford to see a dentist.

"It's just not in my budget," Mr. Maggard

A member of the Lions Club, Mr. Maggard was at a meeting where Dr. Maria Burmaster, the New Orleans Dental Association's MOM chair, spoke about the event to recruit volunteers and donations. After her speech, Mr. Maggard tapped Dr. Burmaster on the shoulder and asked her if the clinic provided donatures.

She invited him to come to her practice, where she took impressions of his mouth and had dentures made to be ready in time for the event.

At the MOM clinic, Dr. Burmaster discovered that Mrs. Maggard's lower dentures weren't fitting properly, so she was also seen by Dr. Dick Hettinger, state chair of the Iowa Dental Association's MOM program.

"Both of them will walk out with a full set of teeth today," Dr. Burmaster said.

Then-ADA President Robert Faiella and then-President-elect Charles Norman visited the clinic and talked with some patients who were eagerly awaiting treatment and grateful for the services being offered.

"It's important to shine a spotlight on the need for oral health care," Dr. Norman said.

"It's a critical event for those who desperately need it," Dr. Faiella said.

Nicole Tamara, 23, was someone in desperate need. Ms. Tamara just started working at a resort but hasn't been with the company long enough to receive dental insurance. She's been in pain for awhile and couldn't wait until January when her benefits kick in.

Ms. Tamara said she doesn't have a regular dentist and already spent \$1,000 on care last month but needed a filling.

She arrived at the MOM event around 5:15 a.m. and spent more than six hours at the clinic.

"This was a huge blessing to me," Ms. Tamara said. "It took a long time, but I'm very thankful."

# **Thinking** strategically

Members First 2020.

New Orleans-Helping all members suc-

The new draft mission statement for the ADA, developed by the ADA Board of Trustees Strategic Plan Steering Committee, is simple and to the point.

You say it twice, you'll never forget it," Dr. Hilton Israelson, chair of the planning committee, said Nov. 1 at the Strategic Plan Open Forum.

Nearly 150 people crowded a ballroom at the Hilton Riverside to hear about Members First 2020, the ADA's strategic plan for 2015-20. Dr. Israelson outlined a draft version of the core precepts, goals and objectives of the plan and audience members asked questions about the development of the plan going forward.

The planning committee opted to retain the current vision statement for the Association: "The ADA: To be the recognized leader in oral health." The new core values are commitment to members; integrity; excellence; commitment to the improvement of oral health; and science/evidence-based.

The new goals are:

- Membership: The ADA will increase member ownership and investment.
- Finance: The ADA will maintain financial sustainability.
- Organizational capacity: The ADA will have sufficient organizational capacity necessary to meet member needs.

The new objectives include:

- Increasing member market share to at least 70 percent of active licensed dentists;
- A 10 percent increase in assessment of member value from membership;
- Increasing the public's perception of ADA members;
- Unrestricted liquid reserves will equal no less than 50 percent of operating expenses;
- Nondues revenue will be at least 65 percent of the total revenue;
- The roles and responsibilities of each element of the tripartite will be clearly defined and agreed upon.

Dr. Ted Sherwin, of Virginia, wanted to explore the objective on the tripartite and asked committee members how the ADA plans to involve all levels of the tripartite in the strategic plan so that it's not just focused at ADA

"The tripartite is an integral part of the new program," Dr. Israelson said.

Dr. Allen Hindin, of Danbury, Conn., encouraged the planning committee to develop a plan that the House of Delegates will be on board with.

"I've seen a lot of planes crash and burn at the House of Delegates over the years," Dr. Hindin said. "You have to get the delegates to believe in the value and importance of change. It won't work otherwise.

A focus group was held Nov. 1 with members to discuss the plan and committee members will meet with ADA staff and hold a webinar with state executives this month. The Board of Trustees will review and vote on the initial plan in April, which will then be used as a working document to develop the budget. The Board will grant final approval in July, Dr. Israelson said.

# New ADA officers, trustees installed for 2013-14

New Orleans—In balloting Nov. 4 at the House of Delegates, Dr. Maxine Feinberg of Westfield, N.J., was elected president-elect of the American Dental Association, and Dr. Jonathan D. Shenkin of Freeport, Maine, was elected second vice president.

In addition, four new trustees were declared elected Nov. 1 in the House: Drs. Jeffrey M. Cole, 4th District; Gary E. Jeffers, 9th District; Andrew J. Kwasny, 3rd District; and Alvin Stevens, 5th District.

On Nov. 5, Dr. Charles H. Norman of Greensboro, N.C., took office as the 150th president of the American Dental Association.

Dr. Norman and the new and returning ADA officers and trustees were installed in their respective offices during proceedings of the 2013 House of Delegates, meeting at the 154th ADA Annual Session in New Orleans.

"I have been blessed with the opportunity to interact with the leadership in this room," the new president told the delegates. "Your commitment to our profession is an inspiration and a source of motivation." (Coverage of his speech appears on Page 1. The full text is posted online in the House of Delegates section of ADA.org under 2013 Board Reports & Resolutions/ Supplemental Information.)

Dr. Norman is a past trustee who represented the ADA's 16th District (North Carolina, South Carolina and Virginia) on the Board of Trustees. He also is a past president of the North Carolina Dental Society and past chair of the ADA Council on Dental Practice. He also chaired the Board Budget and Finance Committee.

He was a Board liaison to the Council on Members Insurance and Retirement Programs, and to the Council on Dental Education and Licensure. He was a delegate to the ADA House from 1994-2008 and also served on boards of the ADA Foundation.

A 1977 graduate of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill School of Dentistry, Dr. Norman is past president of the university's Foundation Board. He also is a past president of the North Carolina Dental Society and its 3rd District Dental Society, and a past member of the North Carolina State Healthcare Commission.

The new president is a member of the Acad-

emy of General Dentistry and a fellow of the American College of Dentists, International College of Dentists and Pierre Fauchard Academy

Dr. Norman has been an ADA member for 36 years.

#### PRESIDENT-ELECT

Dr. Feinberg, the new president-elect, is immediate past trustee of the ADA's 4th District (Delaware, District of Columbia, Federal Dental Services, Maryland, New Jersey, Puerto Rico, Virgin Islands).

As trustee, she served on several Board committees. She chaired the Audit Committee, the Task Force on Student Debt, and the Council on Members Insurance and Retirement Plans.

A 1980 graduate of New York University College of Dentistry, Dr. Feinberg was also a delegate of the FDI World Dental Federation. She is past president of the New Jersey Dental Association and the New Jersey State Board of Dentistry. Dr. Feinberg will succeed Dr. Norman as president next year at ADA 2014—America's Dental Meeting in San Antonio.

#### SECOND VICE PRESIDENT

Dr. Shenkin, the new second vice president, is past chair of the ADA Council on Communications and consultant for the ADA Council on Access, Prevention and Interprofessional Relations. A 1996 graduate of Columbia University College of Dental Medicine, Dr. Shenkin also is past president of the Maine Dental Association and board member of the Maine Dental Political Action Committee.

The following are brief profiles of the ADA officers and trustees, either newly elected or returning this year.

#### **NEW TRUSTEES**

- Dr. Andrew J. Kwasny, Erie, Pa., 3rd District trustee, has been a delegate to the ADA House since 2003. He also served as a member of the ADA Council on Government Affairs, and 2009-10 was president of the Pennsylvania Dental Association. He has been a recipient of the PDA's Presidential Citation four times since 2002.



#### Flex spending rules eased

#### BY CRAIG PALMER

Washington—The Treasury Department will modify long-standing "use-orlose" flexible spending account rules to allow a carryover of up to \$500 of unused FSA funds at employer discretion. Some 14 million families use FSAs to pay for medical and dental expenses.

Today's action directly responds to public comments invited by the Treasury Department and the IRS," Treasury announced Oct. 31. "An overwhelming majority of feedback from individuals, employers and others requested that the use-or-lose rule for health FSAs be modified. Comments pointed to the difficulty for employees of predicting future needs for medical expenditures, the need to make FSAs accessible to employees of all income levels and the desire to minimize incentives for unnecessary spending at the end of the year."

The Association has supported an easing of FSA restrictions, including the Affordable Care Act's \$2,500 annual cap, which took effect in 2013, on employee contributions to employer-sponsored FSAs. Contributions to an FSA are not includable in employee income and reimbursements from an FSA that are used to pay qualified medical expenses are not taxed.

Under the new guidance, and the amended regulations that will reflect Treasury's guidance, employers will still be allowed to offer a grace period for spending down FSAs or a carryover of up to \$500 of unused amounts or neither, but they can't offer both. The "clarifications" of FSA rules may be applied beginning on or after Dec. 28, 2012, the date on which proposed regulations were issued, Treasury said.



commit for a successful future:

- understanding the importance of a unified tripartite aligned for strength;
- recognizing a sense of urgency around membership challenges confronting the tripar-
- gaining insight into the current structure's limitations and future opportunities.

The tripartite's decentralization and autonomy may have served the organization well in the past, but no longer, he said. Having three levels distinctly going their own way within the organization means innovation is often isolated, not easily shared, and services too often are

duplicated. "As a result, we miss opportunities for economies of scale in program development and operations."

He noted, too, that market share challenges are widespread across the tripartite.

"ADA market share lags for the categories of dentists that represent increasing proportions of dental school graduating classes-women and minorities," he said. "That's not a recipe for success; we must expect and demand a better effort."

The tripartite, said Dr. Norman, too often comes across as an "extremely dysfunctional brand" offering a confusing array of services at widely varying dues rates.

"Who would know that we are one organization?" he asked.

The speech is posted in the **House of Delegates section** of ADA.org under 2013 Board **Reports & Resolutions/Sup**plemental Information.

Decentralizing certain services can have its advantages, encouraging innovation that can and should be shared across the system. "But there are absolutely no advantages to uncoordinated tripartite services for members," said the president.

He called on leadership and staff at all levels of the tripartite to come together to review their roles within the organization and to confront the challenge of "balancing and coordinating services to ensure membership growth for years to come."

Added Dr. Norman, "We must develop one brand for organized dentistry. We must deliver goods and services in the most appropriate, efficient and cost-effective manner. We are one organization, not three.'

The ADA is a team, he said, with each level of the tripartite playing a role to help the larger organization succeed.

"Therefore, all of us-in each and every component and constituent—should execute the same game plan, use the same playbook and be on the same page," said the ADA's new president.







#### **FDA to propose pain med restrictions**

Silver Spring, Md.—The U.S. Food and Drug Administration will recommend a more restrictive classification of certain pain medications prescribed by physicians and dentists to "increase the controls on these products." The decision could lead to a reclassification by the Drug Enforcement Administration of hydrocodone-containing combination drug products such as Vicodin.

"Due to the unique history of this issue and the tremendous amount of public interest, we are announcing the agency's intent to recommend to HHS (U.S. Department of Health and Human Services) that hydrocodone combination products should be reclassified to a different and more restrictive schedule," the FDA said in a statement posted at fda.gov.

"This determination comes after a thorough and careful analysis of extensive scientific literature, review of hundreds of public comments on the issue, and several public meetings, during which we received input from a wide range of stakeholders, including patients, health care providers, outside experts and other government

Narcotic analgesics, such as hydrocodone and oxycodone, have become a leading source of drug abuse among teens and adults.

The FDA "has become increasingly concerned about the abuse and misuse of opioid products, which have sadly reached epidemic proportions in certain parts of the United States," the announcement said. "While the value of and access to these drugs has been a consistent source of public debate, the FDA has been challenged with determining how to balance the need to ensure continued access to those patients who rely on continuous pain relief while addressing the ongoing concerns about abuse and misuse.'

The ADA and American Association of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons told federal regulators in a joint statement (ADA.org/news/7725. aspx) that the proposed reclassification from Schedule III to the more restrictive Schedule II could cause inconvenience, unnecessary suffering and higher out-of-pocket costs for patients with a legitimate need" for the medications.

The ADA invites patients to visit MouthHealthy.org/rxabuse to learn more about keeping prescription drugs from becoming a

source of harm.

"By early December, FDA plans to submit our formal recommendation package to HHS to reclassify hydrocodone combination products into Schedule II," the agency said. "We anticipate that the National Institute on Drug Abuse will concur with our recommendation. This will begin a process that will lead to a final decision by the DEA on the appropriate scheduling of these

"Going forward, the agency will continue working with professional organizations, consumer and patient groups and industry to ensure that prescriber and patient education tools are readily available so that these products are properly prescribed and appropriately used by the patients who need them most," the FDA said.

anticipated revenues, but did not seek a dues increase. Expected additional nondues revenues in 2014 are predicted to create a positive net by year end 2014.

The Board of Trustees anticipates positive gains in revenues because of projected favorable results compared to budget, due to three main sources: revenue from strong investment performance; royalty revenue from ADA Business Enterprises Inc.; and royalties from member insurance programs. House actions totaled \$269,000 in expenses over the Board's submitted budget proposal. National dues will remain \$522 in 2014.

Dr. Charles Norman, who was installed as ADA president Nov. 5, said he was heartened by the outcome. "They had the restraint not to spend excess revenue, and going forward, if the House and the Board can continue to have that restraint we can continue to be a fiscally sound organization and deliver relevant services that are of value to our members," he said.

This approach, he said, will benefit all levels of organized dentistry. "The more we can collaborate at all three levels of the tripartite and deliver best-in-class service in an effective and efficient manner, then the more we can utilize our limited resources to accomplish much, much more as an organization."

Dr. Ronald Lemmo, ADA treasurer, credits good fiscal management as much as anticipated revenues in 2013 for the current positive ADA financial picture. "The House, the Board, the volunteers and staff have worked together to make this happen," he said. "Increasing our nondues revenue helps us in turn to stabilize our dues."

Dr. Lemmo reported that the Association's reserves, at 46.78 percent of the operating budget, are closely approaching the 50 percent target level. Also, in 2012, the establishment of a Capital Reserve Fund Account helps protect ADA reserves, and its establishment reduces the likelihood of a special dues assessment for future capital expenditures, he said.

Dr. Maxine Feinberg, ADA president-elect, agreed that changes in the approach to the budget have made a difference. "The budgetary process has improved so much in the last three years. and that is a tribute to the growing trust between the House and Board and also a tribute to our treasurer, Dr. Lemmo," she said.

The 2014 budget reflects the Association's commitment to member value, Dr. Feinberg added. "I think the House understands the importance of our ongoing programs, such as the Center for Professional Success. That is one of the best programs the ADA has produced in the last 20 years, and I hope our members will appreciate its value and use it to its fullest extent."
