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ADA TV PROGRAM TO CARRY HEALTH MESSAGE TO MILLIONS

The National Children's Dental Health Week TV program, "Henry Fonda and the Family" will bring a dental health message to an estimated 20 million persons. The hour-long program will be presented Feb. 6 over CBS at 8:30 E.S.T. The six-minutes of commercial time will be devoted entirely to health education.

The first message shows a boy of about eight visiting his family dentist; the second message shows the boy at about age 13; the third, when he is in college, and the last message when he is married and is bringing his three-year-old daughter to the same dentist. None of the professional people in the messages are actors; there are two dentists--a general practitioner and an oral surgeon, both from the Los Angeles area-a dental assistant and a registered nurse.

The program is sponsored by Procter & Gamble as a salute to the profession. P & G will be identified only at the beginning and end of the program as follows: "This program is supported and sponsored by the Crest Toothpaste Division of Procter and Gamble." The statement is in accordance with rules of sponsorship established by the Columbia Broadcasting System and the Federal Communications Commission.

Relief Fund at 96 Pct. of Goal

The Arizona, Nebraska and North Dakota state dental societies reached over 100 per cent member contribution in the 1961-62 ADA Relief Fund Program by Jan. 15. Total contributions to that date amounted to \$120,021.37 or 96 per cent of the goal of \$125,000.

Timmons Testifies on Aid-To-Education

There may be a serious shortage of dentists in the next 15 years unless additional funds can be made available to dental schools now, Dr. Gerald D. Timmons, ADA presidentelect, told a Congressional committee last week. Dr. Timmons testified before House Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee on HR 4999 introduced by the committee chairman, Rep. Oren Harris (D. Ark.). The bill is expected to be voted out within three weeks. The Senate held hearing on the companion bill, S 1072, last April, but there has been no further action on it.

Two Council Appointments Announced

Pres. John R. Abel has announced the appointments of Dr. Joseph M. Gaynor, Shelton, Conn., to the ADA Council on Insurance and Dr. Clemens R. Aita, Nashville, Tenn., to the Council on International Relations. Dr. Gaynor is also chairman of the insurance committee of the Connecticut State Dental Association. Dr. Aita has been active in professional and civic affairs in Nashville. Both will serve until the 1962 annual session in October, when new council members will be elected. Dr. Gaynor replaces Dr. Hubert A. McGuirl, new First District Trustee, and Dr. Aita replaces Dr. Carl A. Sebelius, now an ADA ass't secretary.

Army Dentists Plan NCDHW Observance

The Army Dental Corps will extend its preventive dentistry program to include observance of National Children's Dental Health Week, Feb. 4-10. A Dep't of the Army circular has been issued urging military commanders to give special emphasis to this week at all installations where dependent children reside.

British Dental Assn. Hits Strike Reports

The British Dental Association has issued a statement following newspaper reports of the Annual Meeting of the General Dental Practitioners' Association at which strike action against the government was urged (Newsletter of Dec. 15, 1961). The statement follows: "The General Dental Practitioners' Association, which is registered as a Trades Union, had at its last return a membership of 484. The BDA with more than 10,000 members, of which the vast majority serve in the National Health Service, has accepted the Pilkington Report. Following this acceptance it is at present engaged in negotiations with the government on dental incomes and fees through the machinery laid down in that Report. These negotiations will take some considerable time and meanwhile the profession is continuing to provide a service for the public under present scales of renumer-The Association has received ation. no resolutions from its members calling for a withdrawal from the Health Service, which would involve the repudiation of the Pilkington Report and the breaking off of the present negotiations."

PAHO Gets \$62,605 Kellogg Grants

The Pan American Health Organization has been awarded two grants totaling \$62,605 from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation of Battle Creek, Mich., for the expansion of the Pan American Health Organization dental health program in Latin America. The first grant is for \$50,600 and will pay a part of the costs of three seminars on dental education to be held in Latin America in 1962, 1964 The 1962 seminar will and 1966. take place in Bogota, Colombia, next October. The '64 and '66 seminars will be held in Mexico and Uruguay.

The second grant, for \$12,005, will pay for the printing of 3,500 copies of a textbook on dental public health written by Dr. Mario Chaves of Brazil, PAHO regional advisor in dental health.

U.S.C. Tests Dental "Teaching Machine"

Dental students at the University of Southern California School of Dentistry may be instructed in some programs by a "teaching machine" instead of a teacher in clinical techniques. According to Dr. Sanford Golden, Westwood, assistant professor of human factors at USC and principal investigator for the pilot program, the "teaching" thus far amounts to one 23-minute illustrated postgraduate lecture on gold foil fillings. He said to produce one set of fiftyone 35-millimeter color slide illustrations and the audio accompaniment more than \$2,000 and over 200 manhours of work on the part of USC faculty members, dental illustrators, writers, narrators and technicians "On the basis of our were needed. pilot program we intend to ask the National Institutes of Health to support us financially in perhaps a two-year study on teaching machines in dentistry," Dr. Golden said.

B. Erana, Philippines, secretary-general. The next meeting of the Congress will be held in Malaya in 1964.


Philippine Dental Society Meets May 9-13

A joint session with the International Association for Dental Research, which is holding its annual session March 15-18 also in St. Louis, will be held Sunday, March 18.

Army Officers Publish Health Series

Preventive dentistry officers at Fort Ord, Calif., and Fort Lewis, Wash., have published a series of dental health education articles in their post newspapers. The articles featuring subjects ranging from brushing habits to dental caries, will be reprinted by publications at other U.S. army installations. Some 250 preventive dentistry officers are now on duty at major Army installations.

ADA Grant Goes to Education Fund

The ADA has transmitted the grant of \$50,000 to the Fund for Dental Education which was earlier authorized by the Board of Trustees. In making the grant, the Board stipulated that one-half was to be made available to the American Association of Dental Schools for the advancement of its program.

Mrs. Velma Child, secretary of the ADA Council on Journalism has been elected an honorary member of the American Association of Dental Editors.

Navy's First Lady Dentist Retires

Cmdr. Sara G. Krout, Evanston, Ill., the navy's first lady dentist. has ended 19 years of service and now has the added distinction of being the first lady dentist to be placed on the navy's retirement rolls. En_ tering the WAVES in 1943, and called to active duty in 1944, Dr. Krout served two years at the Great Lakes Naval Training center. She left active duty in 1946 and has since served in the reserves. Dr. Krout received a degree in dental surgery from the University of Riga in Latvia in 1919, coming to the United States the following year to study at the University of Illinois.

New Medical Care Plan for Aged

A nation-wide insurance program of uniform surgical and medical care benefits for persons 65 or over has been proposed by the National Association of Blue Shield Plans and the American Medical Association. Coverage would cost about \$3 a month per person. Existing Blue Shield programs for older persons offered by the 69 Blue Shield plans in the nation cost \$1.65 to \$8 a month. John W. Castellucci, executive vice president of the Blue Shield organization, said he hoped the plan could be advertised in April and put into operation in July. The program will pay full cost of medical and surgical services for single persons whose annual income is \$2,500 or less and for couples whose income is \$4,000 or less.

ADA Member Heads Canadian University

Dr. John B. Macdonald, Boston, Mass., has been named president of the University of British Columbia, Canada. An ADA member, Dr. Macdonald, since 1956, has been director of the Forsyth Dental Infirmary for Children and Professor of oral microbiology at Harvard University dental school. A native of Canada, Dr. Macdonald will assume his new position July 1.
