Thousands help ADA kick off 154th meeting

"Good morning, colleagues, and welcome to New Orleans and the ADA's 154th Annual Session," said ADA President Robert A. Faiella, addressing a massive, overflow crowd Thursday at the Morial Convention Center in New Orleans for the Opening General Session and Distinguished Speaker Series.

"We have a great week planned for you, and I hope you enjoy it, absorb it and take lessons home with you," said Dr. Faiella, also welcoming colleagues from around the world observing events through ADA365, an online extension.

Thousands of ADA members and guests answered an early call Thursday to help kick off the 2013 annual meeting, with festivities hosted by Dr. Faiella and keynote remarks delivered by President Bill Clinton, founder of the Clinton Foundation and 42nd president of the United States.



Sponsoring the Distinguished Speaker Series in cooperation with the ADA is Church & Dwight Co., makers of Arm & Hammer, Spinbrush and ORAJEL oral care products—and introducing a new oral care system called Arm & Hammer Truly Radiant. Early in the program, Dr. Faiella thanked Procter & Gamble for sponsoring a special commemorative edition of The Journal of the American Association, which has celebrated its centennial this year.

Members attending the meeting each received a ticket in their registration packets entitling them to one complimentary copy of the special JADA edition.

"The ADA is proud of JADA's contributions to the advancement of dental practice and science," said the ADA president.

Dr. Faiella urged everyone to visit the exhibit hall and support the "exhibitors and sponsors instrumental in making this event happen."

He then touched on a number of past and ongoing ADA activities on behalf of the membership and its patients, including a push for tax reform, and efforts to amend both the McCarran-Ferguson statute and ERISA, the Employee Retirement Income Security Act.

Dentistry also is "committed to improving access to oral health for the underserved," he said

Emphasizing the ADA's role as America's leading advocate for oral health, he noted that the Association this year launched Action for Dental Health, a comprehensive approach to addressing the nation's dental health crisis.

Dr. Faiella then turned to what he dubbed "the elephant in the room"—the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, Obamacare.

"Over the past few months," he said, "the ADA has been developing resources for our member dentists to make sure they have the information they need about the Act. We want them to fully understand how it will, and will not, affect them and their patients."

Later he noted, "Our overarching goal of ADA advocacy with federal officials is to ensure a consumer friendly oral health benefits market in each state."

The ADA president then introduced his successor—Dr. Chuck Norman of Greensboro, N.C., who will take office as president next week. In his brief remarks, Dr. Norman hailed

the ADA tripartite system as "unique to the world of professional organizations," able to "meet today's challenges by drawing on the strengths of all three levels of our membership."

Dr. Faiella then presented the ADA Humanitarian Award for 2013 to Dr. Sherwin R. Shinn "an inspirational leader" from Washington State, who has provided volunteer dental services and training for the needy in some 40 countries worldwide.

The huge crowd greeted the honoree with warm applause. "Wow," he said. "This must be Halloween, because I'm feeling really scared right now."

He later said he was accepting "this very prestigious award" on behalf of "all the thousands of dental professionals who are also doing what they can to help—and I accept it on behalf of all of you because you're all heroes for what you do for and with people."

Learn about coming changes and how to better use the CDT Code in the dental practice.

Optimize Your Practice: CDT Code, Claims and More (course 6344) is scheduled for 2-5:30 p.m. Friday in room 218. There is no fee and participants are eligible to receive 3.5 hours of continuing education credit.

CDT 2014 is the Code on Dental Procedures and Nomenclature's latest version that is effective Jan. 1, 2014.



Dentists and dental team members who un-

derstand how the CDT Code is properly used are able to accurately document dental service, and avoid and resolve claim adjudication errors.

The CDT Code is ADA intellectual property and the ADA Council on Dental Benefit Programs oversees its maintenance. The federal government, under the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, designated the CDT Code as the national terminology for reporting dental services.

Dr. Andrew Vorrasi, chair of the CDBP Subcommittee on the Code, and Dr. Ronald Riggins, subcommittee member, will moderate the course.



Affordable Care Act primer

Dr. Robert T. Ferris to receive **ADA Distinguished Service Award**

It started with a simple job shadow.

Dr. Robert T. Ferris spent the summers of his youth following around his uncle, Dr. Alfred Ferris, in his Springfield, Mass., dental practice. He watched him treat and interact with patients and hobnob with local and state dignitaries who passed through town.

"The thing that stuck out more than the dental treatments was the kind of relationships he had with patients. They weren't just customers; they were friends," said Dr. Ferris, 76. "What a wonderful thing, to have people trust you so much."

The experience sparked a passion in Dr. Ferris and launched a more than 50-year career in dentistry that has yet to expire. It's been a career with many pit stops along the way, taking Dr. Ferris to dental laboratories, the U.S. Navy, periodontics, academia and leadership in organized dentistry.

Dr. Ferris will make another pit stop at the House of Delegates meeting at ADA Annual Session when he receives the ADA Distinguished Service Award for 2013. Presented annually, the DSA is the highest honor conferred by the Board of Trustees.

Dr. Ferris said he was "absolutely stunned" to hear he was the DSA recipient this year, not believing it was ADA President Robert Faiella calling to notify him of the honor.

"I know so many deserving people who have made major contributions to the profession, that it would take an hour just to list them," Dr. Ferris said. "At first, I considered the possibility that this was a practical joke and that one of my friends was impersonating Bob Faiella. Seriously. When I realized that it was the real thing, I wanted to tell my daughter and my son, but I didn't because it would have been unseemly. So I sat back and remembered all of the colleagues and friends who opened doors for me and made this possible."

Dr. Ferris attended dental school at Emory University and graduated in 1961. He signed up for the U.S. Navy Reserve in 1960 and was commissioned as a lieutenant in the U.S. Navy Dental Corps. Dr. Ferris was stationed at Oceana Naval Air Station in Virginia Beach, Va., for two years while he was a general dentist for enlisted and Navy personnel.

He fostered an interest in periodontics and received a master's degree in the field from Ohio State University in 1965. Following an internship in oral surgery, Dr. Ferris received

a Ph.D. in immunology from Ohio State. He said his natural inclination was to continue in academic dentistry, which he did at Case Western Reserve in Cleveland, serving in the microbiology department in the medical school and as chair of periodontics department in the dental school until 1971.

That was the year Dr. Ferris opened a solo periodontics practice in Altamonte Springs, Fla. In 1976, he assumed a position as a clinical professor of periodontics at the University of Florida College of Dentistry.

"For a long time I've been able to walk both sides of the street in academic dentistry and clinical practice," Dr. Ferris said. "There's an enormous benefit in being able to do both. A private practice can be very rewarding and fulfilling, but it puts you in what I call a cottage mentality because dentistry can be so rewarding it becomes habituating. But being part time in academics all those years kept up my views of what was happening in the profession: the new research, the new clinical tools. So I always felt like I had the best of both worlds."

Dr. Ferris eventually added a third tier of interest: organized dentistry. His resumé includes a long list of appointments and leadership positions, including: liaison for the Florida Dental Association to the Florida State Board of Dentistry; two appointments by two governors from opposing political parties to the Florida State Board of Dentistry; president of the American Association of Dental Examiners; president of the Florida Dental Association; president of the American Academy of Periodontology; director and chair of the American Board of Periodontology; and ADA delegate.

"Because of all of this, he's very knowledgeable; not only about a great many of the issues that affect dentistry but he also has an innate knowledge of how to play in political circles, which is a whole different game," said Dr. S. Timothy Rose, past ADA president, who's known Dr. Ferris since dental school. "He is also very visionary. He can not only look at what may be coming up on the horizon and predict where we're going to be but he has the ability to sit down with people from different perspectives and come to some common agreement to what it all means."

Dr. Ferris was elected 2nd vice president of the ADA in 2004 and served as 1st vice president from 2005-06. When asked if he would describe himself as ambitious, Dr. Ferris pointedly said no.

"Virtually every time one of these opportunities arose, some people persuaded me that I should do it," Dr. Ferris said. "They always pointed out that if I didn't, someone else would fill in that spot, and they just had more confidence in me. When they said they had confidence in me, it was a boost to the ego. I would think, 'Maybe I can do that job.'

Dr. Ferris is now a minimal participant in organized dentistry, preferring to mentor up-andcoming leaders within the profession. Dr. Larry Nissen, a colleague of more than 20 years, said Dr. Ferris's devotion to dentistry is unparalleled.

"Not only has he served, he has also mentored many inexperienced volunteers, coaching and encouraging them throughout their careers. Bob's extensive knowledge and his ability to assimilate this knowledge into easily understandable conversation is a very unique characteristic of him," Dr. Nissen said. "He is always available to advise, counsel or just listen, whatever the situation may require. Our profession needs more people like Bob Ferris, and hopefully this recognition of him will remind us of the responsibility each of us has to our profession and our colleagues."

Dr. Ferris has not only impressed his friends and colleagues with his leadership skills, he's charmed them with his humor and personality.

"Dr. Ferris has a bright sense of humor and he embodies the idea of taking his responsibilities seriously, without taking himself too seriously," said Dr. Alan Friedel, who served in various leadership roles alongside Dr. Ferris.

"Bob has worked hard over the years to maintain a consistently high standard of care for his patients; never forgetting that the root of the word doctor is teacher. He is a highly ethical man who can be forgiving and has always shown respect to all others, especially to those who were his political adversaries. He remains generous with his time, generous in sharing his gifts both intellectual and financial and is the very model of what a true professional should be. I am proud to call him my friend."

Dr. Ferris has certainly been generous to dentistry. He donated \$1 million in 2006 to benefit both the Florida Dental Health Foundation and the American Academy of Periodontology Foundation. Both foundations were partner organizations of a national campaign to secure the future of dental education.

"I think it's important for everyone in the dental family to understand the pressing needs of the dental education system in our country," Dr. Ferris said at the time. "I hope that this gift will encourage people to ask questions, identify needs in education and make their legacy gift to a dental education project that is important to them."

Dr. Ferris's professional interests go beyond dentistry. He previously owned several hundred apartments at the University of Central Florida; developed and owned a chain of convenience stores in central Florida; and helped organize and sell three commercial

"The wonderful thing about the practice of dentistry is you can make room for those other things in your life," said Dr. Ferris, who has two children, Leah Yankus, Ph.D., a psychologist, and Robert L. Ferris, M.D., Ph.D., the chief of head and neck cancer at the University of Pittsburgh Medical School.

Dr. Ferris, who enjoys golf and fly fishing, has been with his domestic partner, Jennifer Corey, for 16 years and still practices dentistry three days a week in Deland, Fla. He has no plans to retire and said a quote from the golfer Jack Nicklaus has resonated with him, where he talks about his amazement over being paid to do something he loves so much.

"That always stuck with me because I've never known someone who was excellent at what they did and didn't love it," Dr. Ferris said. "It's like that saying, 'If you love what you do, you'll never work another day in your life.' It's a great career." ■

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

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


Mrs. Ryser said her goal is to reach out to state and local dental associations to help them learn how a strong Alliance can strengthen and support their work.

Learning about screening at the Professional **Product Review**

This year's Professional Product Review is focused on prevention and screening.

Dentists who visited the PPR, located in Hall D, booth 1857, learned how to screen for diabetes and heart disease by using a few simple machines and processes. Participants went through the screening themselves and learned how to conduct their own screenings in their offices.

Dr. Kevin Kays, of Marion, Ill., visited Thursday to learn more about what he could take back to the public health arena but was initially attracted to the booth after seeing Dr. David Wong, who was there promoting research on saliva diagnostics.

Dr. Wong, a professor and associate dean of research at the University of California-Los Angeles, said he and his colleagues are in the process of developing a chairside diagnostic tool that would determine whether a patient with dry mouth has an autoimmune disease like Sjogren's Syndrome. Current technology is available for a dentist to test and determine right away whether the patient should be referred to a medical professional or can be treated in the dental office.

"Early detection is the key and having the ability to screen for medical conditions in a noninvasive atmosphere is great," Dr. Wong

Dr. Kays agrees, adding he's impressed with Dr. Wong's research and developments.


"I think it's a significant improvement on diagnostics," Dr. Kays said.



Forum examines predicted growth of group practice

Group practices may only make up a small share of the dental market, but all signs point to the concept growing, according to panelists at a forum Thursday.

The Growth of Group Practice gathered Dr. Howard Bailit, Ph.D., professor emeritus at the University of Connecticut Health Center, Marko Vujicic, Ph.D., managing vice president of the ADA Health Policy Resources Center, and Jon Holtzee, director of state government affairs at the ADA, to discuss how group practices are growing in the United States and why more dentists are interested in working for them.

"Can we as a profession retain some sameness and also adapt to change?" asked moderator Dr. Todd Marshall, member of the ADA Council on Dental Practice, who also serves on the board for Park Dental, a group practice in Minnesota owned solely by den-

Dr. Bailit discussed the factors that influenced the growth of group practice in medicine and whether they apply to dentistry.

The largest similarity is the need for health organizations to be bigger in order to have more leverage when negotiating with insurance companies, Dr. Bailit said.

This is already happening in medicine, and Dr. Bailit predicts it will grow within dentistry; with more dentists joining or forming group practices so they are more powerful against third-party payers.

HPRC is in the midst of studying different group practice models and why dentists choose to start their own group practice or join an existing one.

While the research isn't complete, Dr. Vujicic said HPRC is studying whether there are differences in efficiencies between different care delivery models; differences in dentists' satisfaction, earnings or work/life balance; and any measureable differences on the pa-

HPRC recently conducted an environmental scan of the dental profession to help the ADA Board of Trustees develop a strategic plan for 2015-20.

A panel of experts was convened—including dental and health economists, CEOs of dental service organizations and other outside experts—and asked their thoughts on the future of group practice.

"Unequivocally, this panel of experts said this is a segment that's going to grow," Dr. Vujicic said.

This growth will specifically be driven by new and younger dentists, and there will be more demand on organizations geared toward helping them navigate the ins and outs of starting and managing a practice and business, Dr. Vujicic said.

While student debt is an important driver of the decisions of new graduates-including whether to start a solo practice or join a group practice—gender, race and where students attended dental school play a larger role in their choices after graduation, he said.


