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
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# DR. BUSHEL URGES HEALTH PROFESSIONS TO AID IN POVERTY WAR

Poverty is the third leading cause of death, Dr. Arthur Bushel, acting health commissioner of New York City, told the 17th National Dental Health Conference, held last week at ADA Headquarters. Dr. Bushel, who delivered

the keynote address, said that the health professions, as well as government, must fulfill a role in eliminating poverty. "It is clear that poor health and disability are among the primary causes of poverty and indeed in New York City we sometimes are moved to point out that poverty is actually the third leading cause of death. The basis for this statement is that if we were able to achieve for our low income districts the same death rates which we observe in the high income districts, the savings in human lives would be equivalent to eliminating the third leading cause of death," he said. He noted that infant mortality in low income groups runs three times as high as in higher income families. He emphasized that dental care available under War on Poverty projects have proved to be the greatest attraction to children from low socio-economic levels.

As an example of the growing role of dentistry in large-scale attacks on poverty, he noted that in the New York HEADSTART program for pre-school children, twice as much was spent on dental care as on general health care.

Dr. Bushel said that the role of the health professions has changed drastically in recent years as the professions have been faced more and more with the special problems of chronic disease: institutional care and longterm ambulatory care. He said that "progressive" institutions are now

offering dental care for long-term patients. Another implication of the change is that a family dentist must be alert to how well a patient with "a little heart disease, a little arthritis and a little diabetes" will stand up under dental treatment. "But also the dentist should play the role of a health counselor equipped to refer people for proper health care and even to detect danger signs," he added.

Another speaker at the Conference, Fred H. Steininger, director of the Bureau of Family Services, Welfare Administration, Department of Health, Education and Welfare, called for a part-

## May Is AFDE Month

Dr. Hickey received his dental and master of science degrees from Ohio State University and was associated with its College of Dentistry from 1953-1962. He joined the faculty of Kentucky in 1962. The Georgia dental school anticipates admitting its first freshman class in 1968.

Claire Danziger, assistant director of the ADA Bureau of Public Information from 1950-58, died April 23 of cancer in Chicago. Miss Danziger was a graduate of the University of Chicago and Columbia University Graduate School of Journalism. She had served as assistant foreign editor of the Chicago Sun before joining the ADA staff. She had been director of publicity since 1959 at the Chicago Medical School. Miss Danziger is survived by her mother, two brothers and a sister.

#### **ADA Receives Certificate From ALAFO**

The Association of Latin American Dental Schools has presented a certificate to the ADA on the occasion of the dedication of the ALAFO's new headquarters building in San Salvador. The certificate recognizes assistance given by the ADA, particularly a three-year grant of \$10,000 made through the Pan-American Health Organization, for the establishment of the ALAFO central office.

#### ADA HOUSING BUREAU OPENS FOR 107th ANNUAL SESSION IN DALLAS

More than 15,000 dentists and representatives of related health areas are expected to attend the 107th annual session of the ADA in Dallas, Nov. 14-17. Housing registration applications are available in the ADA Journal.

The scientific session of the ADA session will be held Nov. 14-17 in the Dallas Memorial Auditorium. Approximately 700 dental educators, scientists and practitioners will participate. Dentists interested in presenting clinical lectures (20 minutes, illustrated with slides), table clinics. scientific exhibits or motion pictures are requested to write for an official form to the ADA Council on Scientific Session, 211 E. Chicago Ave., Chicago, 60611. In making application for participation in the scientific session, the exact type of exhibit or presentation must be It will be permissible for an individual to participate in more than one area of the scientific program, but it will not be permissible to give two presentations of the same type, such as two clinical lectures. The preliminary program of the scientific session will be published in the August 1966 issue of the ADA Journal.

#### - Space Dentistry Symposium -

One of the highlights of the scientific session will be a half-day symposium on dental implications of space flight. Col. Arthur Stumpf of the U.S. Air Force will speak on dental support of man in space and Lt. Col. Ira B. Shannon of the USAF School of Aerospace Medicine will report on salivary secretory changes a ssociated with space flight and stress. Pressure physiology and periodontal health will be discussed by Dr. Harvey W. Lyon, ADA senior research associate.

Screening procedures for lecture applicants began May 1 and deadline for submission of research awards applications is June 1. nership of the health professions and federal and state authorities to "help us close the gaps in the distribution of health care and welfare in this country." He said that the extent to which the new Medical Assistance Program, created under Title 19 of the Social Security Law, serves its purpose will "depend largely upon how well a state's public welfare agencies and the medical and health community can coordinate their knowledge, skills and resources." He urged establishment of medical care units in every state public welfare agency and said it will be "equally important for public welfare agencies to have a medical advisory committee which should include representatives of dentistry and the other health professions." Mr. Steininger pointed out that when the new program is adopted by all states, it could provide comprehensive high quality medical and dental care for as many as "35 million medically needy people -- about one-fifth of our population."

A third speaker told the Conference that dental practice gradually is being changed dramatically by fluoridation. Dr. Bruce L. Douglas of the University of Illinois College of Dentistry said that "it is inevitable that anything which eliminates so much of the major disease problem with which dentists spend the bulk of their practicing hours must make a marked imprint on practice. current emphasis on restoration and repair will shift to a greater emphasis on diagnosis, prevention and maintenance. Dentists will do less exodontia and there will be decreased need for endodontia as well. More attention will be given to periodontics and maintenance of the health of the supporting structures of the mouth," he stated.
