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### SECOND NATIONAL PR CONFERENCE COVERS SPEAKERS BUREAUS, NEWSPAPERS

Roles of state and local societies in developing speakers bureaus and the use of newspaper columns on dentistry were highlighted at the Second National Public Relations Conference, held in Chicago Aug. 2-3. ADA Sec. Harold Hillenbrand keynoted the Conference, which was supported by a grant from the Procter & Gamble Co. Other speakers on the program included a newspaper editor, a public relations agency head, a member of a state women's dental auxiliary and several dental practitioners active in public relations. Attendance at the two-day Conference was 150.

# **Newspaper Columns**

Dr. Frank A. Green, Chattanooga, Tenn., described the Tennessee state society-sponsored weekly newspaper column which is distributed to key newspapers throughout the state. He pointed out that the newspaper column is essential to increasing the public's knowledge of dentistry and said that although "our fund of general knowledge is doubled every 20 years and our total knowledge in the field of science is doubled every 10 years," it is unlikely that the public's knowledge of dentistry has doubled in the last 15 or 20 years. Dr. Green listed several pointers for societies interested in developing a newspaper column. First, he said, it must be remembered that "newspapers don't need dental columns to fill up their space." Therefore, the material submitted must be well written and interesting. Additionally, personal contact with the newspaper editor is essential toward building good will and paving the way to possible acceptance of the column. The basic

purpose of such columns should be stressed to the editor; that is, they are meant to be educational, they are an effort to promote good health and they will be prepared by an authoritative and ethical professional organization. Dr. Green said his society's dental column is currently appearing in 12 daily newspapers and 17 weeklies.

Mrs. Lincoln Todd, president of the Northern Virginia Women's Auxiliary, told the Conference of a successful newspaper supplement on dentistry prepared by the Auxiliary. She pointed out that, when soliciting financial support for the supplement, it is always important to remember that "there are some businesses which would seem in poor taste to advertise in a dental health publication." proval for the supplement was received from the Northern Virginia Dental Society. Three benefits accrued to dentistry as a result of the column, Mrs. Todd said: public acceptance was high, cordial relations were created with the local newspaper and the participating merchants gained a new appreciation of dentistry.

# Speakers Bureaus

Anthony M. Franco, president of a public relations firm bearing the same name, discussed the creation of a state speakers bureau as developed by the Michigan State Dental Association. Mr. Franco stressed that

"every state dental society should have a speakers bureau, for no other form of activity can do such an excellent job of communications." listed these actions as necessary in the development of a speakers gather information on active bureau: speakers bureaus from component societies; hold a conference for all interested component members to formulate plans for a statewide bureau; develop tools, such as brochures, to publicize the bureau to the profession and the public, follow up with both members of the speakers bureau and the public to see that continuing activity is maintained. Mr. Franco added that the function of the state society in a speakers bureau program should be one of guidance and maintenance to assure that the program will continue to grow. ponent societies must provide the basics: speakers, audiences and programs.

In addition to Mr. Franco, the executive secretary of the Los Angeles County Dental Society, Miss Ruth Hart, discussed the responsibilities of the local society in developing a speakers bureau, and Dr. Raymond H. Myers, University of Wisconsin speech professor, spoke on "The Speaker's Platform: The Neglected Medium."

# Editor's View

James P. Brown, Jr., editor of The Ypsilanti (Mich.) Press, presented his views on public relations from the editor's side of the newspaper Newspaper editors, he said, insist that any publicity item for the newspaper be factual, of interest to the readers and concise. suggested, when making contact with a newspaper for a possible story, that the "place to start is either with the reporter who covers that particular field or the city editor." In addition, "make sure that you keep fresh blood moving into the program: don't depend on one man to serve as committee chairman forever, he's bound to go stale." Brown also suggested that the public relations committee should not neglect the weekly newspaper. "These papers are the 20th century frontier in journalism and well worth your consideration in any public relations program."

In another paper, Kenneth L. Croft, deputy secretary for the Canadian Dental Association, told the audience of the technic used by his association to deal with the media on a specific issue. Because the controversy over fluoridation in the publication Saturday Review was based on an article by three Canadians, Mr. Croft pointed out that the CDA was forced to take public action on the matter. First. a group of competent scientists prepared a critical review of the article cited in Saturday Review. The full review was circulated in scientific circles and a summary review was prepared for the public. Additionally, the president of CDA wrote a short letter of criticism to the magazine. Finally, "Toronto science writers and editors, editorial page writers, and broadcasting officials were invited to join our people for cocktails and dinner." The dinner provided an informal atmosphere for frank discussion on the fluoridation controversy with the result that "a dialogue was established between dentistry and the press that night."

#### Television in PR

Although the focus of the national Conference was on speakers bureaus and newspapers, Dr. Lawrence Krasne, Miami, Fla., showed the participants a Kinescope recording of a television program on dentistry that was prepared by the Florida society. The program dealt with public service activities of the dental society. Financial sponsorship of the program was provided by the South Florida Dairy Council and the program was presented over a local television station.

#### CONFERENCE ON DENTAL LABORATORY EDUCATIONAL STANDARDS OCT. 14-15

A national conference to review educational standards for dental laboratory technicians will be conducted in Chicago, Oct. 14-15, by the ADA Council on Dental Education. Sponsors of the conference will include the

ADA Council on Dental Trade and Laboratory Relations, the American Association of Dental Schools, and the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Dental Laboratories. Sponsoring agencies have been able to extend the scope of the fall conference through grants from the American Fund for Dental Education and the Oral Health Committee of the Editorial Council of the Journal of Prosthetic Dentistry.

According to Reginald H. Sullens, secretary of the Council and ADA assistant secretary for educational affairs, purpose of the conference will be to "study some of the major problems and influences which have delayed growth of formal training in dental laboratory technology, so that immediate and long range work force needs of the profession and industry can be accommodated with more adequate programs and particularly with programs that are attuned to realistic occupational and technical performance levels." Mr. Sullens added: "In the period between 1957 and 1965, school development in this field of auxiliary education has failed to progress and keep pace with contrasting high rates of expansion in dental assisting and dental hygiene." He pointed out that federal funds are available at state and local levels for development of vocational-technical curriculums in community colleges, technical centers, health occupation training centers and similar institutions. Invitations have been sent to dental practitioners, dental examiners, dental educators, dental technology educators, certified dental technicians and dental laboratory owners.

# N.Y. Appeals Court OK's Fluoridation

The New York Court of Appeals, the state's highest court, has rendered the opinion that fluoridation for New York City is constitutional and lawful. The high court's ruling is in response to efforts by anti-fluoridationists to have the measure declared unconstitutional. Fluoridation began in New York City in September 1965.

#### **NIDR** Issues Information Booklet

"The National Institute of Dental Research" is a new booklet just released by the U.S. Public Health Service. The brochure describes the many facets of research on oral diseases being conducted at NIDR — tooth decay, periodontal disease, oral ulcerations and cleft lip and palate. The need to increase the number of scientists engaged in dental research is also discussed. #### Flint OK's Fluoridation 2nd Time

Residents of Flint, Mich., approved fluoridation in a referendum Aug. 2 for the second time. The measure was first approved in April 1965.

#### JCADL ELECTS DICKSON CHAIRMAN; ACCEPTS 2 NEW MEMBER ORGANIZATIONS

Mr. Homer Dickson of Fort Smith, Ark., was elected chairman of the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Dental Laboratories at the group's annual meeting July 31-Aug. 1 in the ADA Headquarters. He succeeds Dr. J.

Eugene Ziegler of Hollywood, Calif. Dr. Norman H. Olsen of Chicago was chosen vice-chairman and Dr. A.H. Grunewald of Chicago was elected treasurer. The Joint Commission also approved the Dental Laboratory Owners Forum, a group of owners of accredited dental laboratories, and the U.S. Army Dental Corps for membership. DLOF will have three representatives and the Army Dental Corps will have one representative on the Board of Commissioners, which then will increase to 20 members.

# **MSDA** Wins Income Tax Ruling

The Internal Revenue Service has ruled that the Michigan State Dental Association does not owe federal tax on its income from annual meeting exhibits. The decision was reached by the Appellate Division Branch Office, Central Region of the Last year, the association received a formal assessment for more than \$32,000 in federal income tax on its exhibit income from 1958 through 1963. A previous appeal in 1965 to the IRS Detroit District Office was rejected. Although the MSDA is a not-for-profit organization and exempt from federal income taxes, IRS contended that the association's exhibit income was "unrelated" to the primary activities of the association and therefore subject to federal taxation. This new ruling will not prevent IRS from attempting to tax MSDA exhibit income in years after 1963, but such action at least in the near future is unlikely, according to MSDA officials.
