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JOINT REPORT ON CHILDREN'S PROGRAM MAILED TO DELEGATES, ALTERNATES

Complete copies of the Joint Report on the proposed National Dental Health Program for Children were mailed Sept. 16 to all delegates and alternates of the 1966 ADA House of Delegates. The Joint Report, prepared

ternates of the 1966 ADA House of by a special Task Force and the Councils on Dental Health and Legislation and Bureaus of Dental Health Education, Economic Research and Statistics, and Public Information, is contained in Supplement I to Reports of Officers and Councils. The Supplement was also sent to the presidents, presidents-elect, secretaries, executive secretaries and editors of all constituent and component societies, as well as to other groups.

Supplement I also contains a Report of the Special Committee on Trustee Districts, a supplemental report from the Council on Dental Research, a resolution from the Maryland State Dental Association on reorganization of trustee districts, and a resolution from the Mount Baker District Dental Society of Washington regarding fiscal and administrative aspects of dental treatment programs It further lists under Medicare. three Board Reports to the House: Association affairs and resolutions; recommendations on reports of councils and resolutions, and recommended amendments of Bylaws and report on civil rights.

The proposed children's program is the result of a directive of the 1965 House of Delegates. The proposal was approved by the Board of Trustees at its summer meeting Aug. 24-27 and will be presented to the House at the Dallas session in November for approval.

The Joint Report states that the "ADA, on the basis of its unique competence in the field of dentistry and under its obligation to foster the improvement of personal and national health, recommends a national dental health program for the children of the United States. Such a program has been the objective of the Association and of the dental profession for many years."

He served as dental consultant to the International Cooperation Administration, Rio de Janeiro from 1951 to 1956.

Dental Exhibit At Smithsonian

The Smithsonian Institution's new "Hall of Medical Sciences", which was opened recently, includes one of the world's largest dental collections. Among items on display are: fiberstick toothbrushes, Victorian toothbrushes and gold toothpicks with motherof-pearl handles, dentures made of human and animal teeth and of carved ivory and the early 19th century bowdrill and pick used for drilling teeth. Dr. C. Willard Camalier, Sr., director emeritus of the ADA Washington Office, worked closely with the Institution in obtaining the dental exhibits.

TEACHING MACHINE COURSES SCHEDULED FOR DALLAS ANNUAL SESSION

The U.S. Public Health Service Dental Health Center in San Francisco will present three courses of programed instruction at the ADA annual session Nov. 14-17 in Dallas. All dentist participants are invited to test

their diagnostic skills in one or more of the courses. First course, "Indications for Gingivectomy and Gingivoplasty" will be offered Monday, Nov. 14, at 9:30 a.m. and again at 2 p.m. It will review specific indications and contraindications of periodontal disease and call attention to other periodontal deformities. Diagrams, color photographs and a motion picture will be used to show diagnostic tools and technics and basic surgical steps.

The second course, which will be presented Tuesday, Nov. 15, also at 9:30 a.m. and 2 p.m., will cover "Surgical Procedures for Gingivoplasty." Designed to supplement the first course, it will include such procedures as measuring and marking periodontal pockets, estimating correct line and angle of incision, necessary considerations in shaping and contouring the gingiva and postoperative treatment. Instruction will be presented by diagrams, color photographs and several motion picture clips. Final course on "Early Detection of Oral Cancer Using Exfoliative Cytology," will be presented Wednesday, Nov. 16, at 9:30 Offered in two vera.m. and 2 p.m. sions -- one hour in length and 15 minutes -- this course will include a review of recommended procedures in a complete oral examination and provide guidelines for identification of lesions that should have cytological screening. All courses will be presented in the Dallas Memorial Auditorium.

It is recommended that the program should be started by the selection of a number of communities which will establish pilot or exploratory programs to provide the professional, administrative, statistical and other data which are needed to guide the national program in its future development. Funding will be largely on the traditional grant-in-aid basis and responsibility for the planning and cooperation of the program will rest heavily at state and local levels.

Other recommendations made in the Joint Report include:

--All dental services should be provided under the program which are necessary to prevent disease and to restore and maintain oral health;

--The program must insure the provision of the highest quality of dental care and special emphasis must be placed on preventive services;

--All preschool and school children through the age of 18 should eventually be included in a national program;

--There should be a continuing, organized program of dental health and patient education,

--Administration at the national level should be coordinated through an Inter-Agency Committee with representation from all federal agencies having a role in the dental program,

--Government funding should only be used for financing dental care for indigent children. Dental care for non-indigent children should be provided by private sources primarily through extension of prepayment plans.
